The TWAS Online Directory of Fellows and Young Affiliates is a modern digital publication, which gives global visibility to our members.

Click the link 'Edit my profile' in the grey menu on the left. You will be taken to a form containing two main sections:

- Basic details
- Additional details

Basic details

In this section you will find personal information and membership details. Only TWAS staff can edit this part, if you see an error, please write to yearbook@twas.org for correction.

Your past nationality, and your place and date of birth will be public only if you tick the appropriate box.

Additional details

This section includes your photo and contains information about your current position, your scientific work and your contact details. You can edit all of those elements. You will have considerable latitude to decide what the public will see, and what will remain private.

New picture:

You can upload a new photo for your profile. Use a digital headshot, in colour, not too close. Click on "Choose file" and pick the desired image from the files in your computer.

Please fill in or update the details below. One section is for contact information that will be available only to TWAS Fellows, Young Affiliates and the Secretariat; another is for contact information that would be visible to the public. You can consent to the publication of other information by checking the relevant boxes.

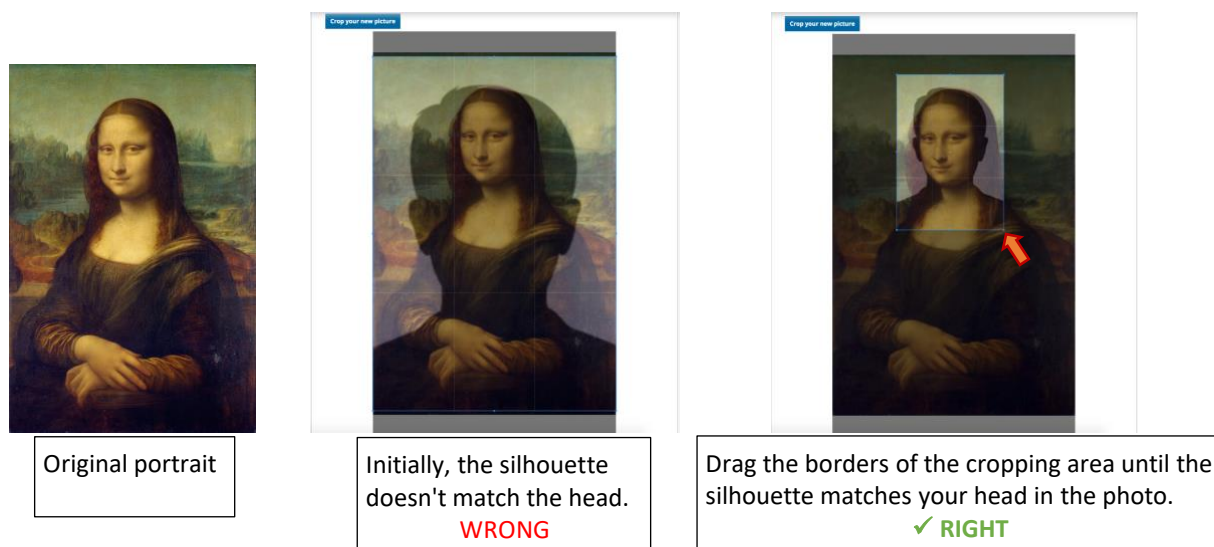

Your picture will then be displayed behind a transparent silhouette template that will help you crop the image to the right size.

You just have to drag the blue borders of the cropping area until you have a good match.

If for example you upload a half-body portrait, this is what you will get.



If the original portrait already matches the silhouette, just click inside the cropping area to pin it. If you do not click at least once inside the cropping area you will not be able to save your profile.

Contact information:

You will find **two sub-sections for contact information**:

- **Contact information:** for details that will be available only to TWAS Fellows, Young Affiliates and the Secretariat;
- **Public contact information:** for details that would be visible to the public, if you choose to provide them.

Biodata:

The text of the biodata entry can be up to 1,200 characters, including spaces. As much as possible, please avoid using acronyms for the names of institutions, as many people may not be aware of what the acronyms stand for. Please see a sample below.

Palis (PhD, 1967, UC Berkeley, USA) is Professor, Instituto Nacional de Matemática Pura e Aplicada, Rio de Janeiro; President, Brazilian Academy of Sciences, and past President of TWAS. He was: Secretary and President, International Mathematical Union; Vice-President, International Council of Scientific Unions (now International Science Council); Chair, Scientific Council of Abdus Salam International Centre for Theoretical Physics; member scientific councils for ETH-Zürich and Collège de France. His prizes include Moinho Santista and National Prize for Science and Technology, Brazil; Inter American Prize for Science; Mexico Prize for Science and Technology; TWAS Prize in Mathematics and Trieste Science Prize; Accademia Nazionale dei Lincei and Balzan Prizes in Mathematics. He is a member of the Brazilian, Latin American, Chilean, Indian (2), Mexican, Norwegian, Russian, French, European, US National, Leopoldina, Lincei, Lisbon, and Chinese science academies. He holds honorary degrees from 10 universities and the Chinese Academy of Sciences Honorary Einstein Professorship.
